

The DAISY Award® for Extraordinary Nurses

In 1999, Bonnie and Mark Barnes envisioned a way to honor their son's early death due to complications of ITP (Idiopathic Thrombocytopenia Purpura). As the Barnes family discussed what to do in their son's memory, they knew that first and foremost, they needed to show appreciation for the gifts that nurses give their patients and families every day, just as they had experienced. The goal is to ensure that nurses know how deserving they are of society's profound respect for the education, training, and skill they put into their work, and especially for the compassion with which they deliver their care. The acronym for the DAISY Award for Extraordinary Nurses is Diseases Attacking the Immune System. It is an international award, which recognizes extraordinary clinical nurses who care for patients by providing exceptional care every day.














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










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CI Roadmap: Same Day Joints Ready to Go Time


Aim

1. Problem

Providers noted that same day total joint patients have a varying degree of readiness to go time in the phase two area of BOND Center. Several processes have been identified by staff that cause delay in discharge.

2. Current State

Distribution: Minutes from Entering Bond to Discharge



3. SMART Goal

Improve ready to go time from PACU phase 2 to discharge to car by 30 min by 9/15/24. Goal met: (Mean 200" vs 170")

Measure

4. Analysis

- Discharge medication issues
 - E-scripts to wrong pharmacy
 - Pre approval for narcotics
 - Pharmacy closed before discharge
- Meds sent and are out of stock (i.e. oral Dilaudid)
- Resuming anticoag meds (Xarelto; Eliquis)
- Accurate home med rec completed
- Discharge orders needing clarification
- · Ride availability
- · Patient education
- · Timely mobility

Change

5. Proposed Countermeasures

- Review documentation needs w/RNs for spinal resolution UBC
- · Re-educate RNs on dermatome levels and assessment UBC
- RNs track delay root causes, potential barriers/proposed solutions
- Create standardized pt education process starting in pre-op, including family and ending in phase 2
- Have pt transferred to chair while awaiting Pt when appropriate
- Allow wash-in period of June 2024 due to Epic and new processes
- Track documentation of spinal resolution for July/August
- · Examine remaining barriers and implement goals

CI Roadmap: Same Day Spine Ambulation



Aim

1. Problem

There is a large push to get all postop patients out of bed day of surgery. Early ambulation of the spine patient starts in the surgeon's office and continues throughout PASU, the BOND center, and then the inpatient unit. An NEBH goal is to ambulate our postop patients as soon as possible and safe to do so in order to achieve better postop outcomes.

2. Current State



3. SMART Goal

Improve % of 5 West spine patients who get out of bed on their day of surgery to >80% consistently each month by September 19th 2024.

Measure

4. Analysis

Multiple root causes were identified of where our current process of same day spine ambulation could go wrong. A meeting was held on 6/11/24 to identify these causes. The Impact-Influence Matrix was used to prioritize which root cause(s) will be addressed. Out of the 12 root causes identified by our team, we found that Pain not Adequately Controlled fell under Medium Impact/High Team Control and Patient Refused/RN too busy both fell under High Impact/High Team Control.

Change

5. Proposed Countermeasures

- Highest Impact/Highest Team Control root causes were Patient Refuses and RN too Busy. We focused on Patient Refuses.
- Create a 1 sheet educational flyer listing the benefits involved with early ambulation to give to spine patients that refuse out of bed (OOB) day of surgery. We currently have posters/ signage around the hospital listing benefits of early ambulation and education is now provided pre-op in the surgeon's office, however there is no pamphlet or form put into place to hand to our patients postop to review if they decide to refuse OOB.

6. Results

At this current time, there has been no usage of this educational flyer. The flyer with instructions remains at the nurse's station and will continue to be mentioned in rounds for 5 West use. Tracking usage will be important to see if this flyer is worth introducing to other units.

Barriers for little to no data collection at this time may include but aren't limited to: Epic implementation, insufficient time for data collection (flyer was introduced August 27th and officially rolled out on September 1st).

7. Follow-Up

 I will continue to track data until Maternity leave (end of October) and ask 5 West UBC to take on this task going forward until the end of this year (December 31st 2024). The data tracking will consist of tracking the flyer usage and the patient's agreeability to ambulate after education was provided. We will also continue to track the 5 West monthly Spine Dashboards for patient ambulation percentages to see if they are trending up.

Reducing Noise on 5 East

Aim


1. Problem

5 East has had difficulty sustaining a satisfactory patient reported noise score. Previous projects addressing this concluded the issues were staff conversations, doors, and medical equipment. "Increased noise exposure has been shown to be associated with worsened patient anxiety levels, and sleep quality. It may also be a potential environmental stressor for patients at risk for falls. And it may impact patients' heart rate and blood pressure, as well as length of hospital stay, wound healing rates, and gastric activity"

2. Current State

Current state (March 2024) Quietness of Hospital Environment: 60.0%.




3. SMART Goal

5 East's goal is to increase our HCAHPS score for "Quietness of Hospital Environment" from 60% to 62% to align with the NEBH target by September 30, 2024.

Measure

4. Analysis

20 patients received a 5-question survey on various days of the week. 40% said they were not disturbed by noise during their stay but 60% were. The most common reasons were staff voices, beeping in their rooms, or beeping in hallways.



Change

5. Proposed Countermeasures

- · Placing earplugs at each patients bedside.
- Shutting patients doors at night when/if safe for the patient.
- Educating staff about ways to work together as a team to lower the noise within the unit.
- Providing information to patients on proposed countermeasures.
- Create a team of stakeholders to discuss survey results. (5E clinical leader, 5E Mgr, and 5E unlicensed assistive personnel)

6. Results

- 20 post-surveys completed late August 2024 and 67% of patients who utilized the earplugs said those lessened the noise
- Awaiting August data but 5E has already seen improvement in June 2024 100% and in July 2024 66.7%. Both of which are above our goal of 62%.

Sustain

7. Follow-Up

- Concerns were brought up by stakeholders regarding cost and return on investment. Ex. if we give earplugs to every single patient admitted to the floor will the majority actually use them.
- Potentially a more sustainable approach is to offer available noise canceling items such as earplugs on an as needed basis.
- HCAHPS Quietness of hospital environment in % will continue to be reported by the Quality analytics manager or quality performance manager.

NEBH Residency Program

The Transition to Practice/Nurse Residency Program for new nurse graduates to enter practice into the operating room or surgical patient care units continues to thrive. In 2024, NEBH welcomed 12 new graduate nurses into the Nurse Residency Program; 10 to the surgical Patient Care Units, and 2 to the Operating Room.

We trialed, to great success, a new program, Supportive Achievement of Foundational Elements (S.A.F.E.), to enhance and standardize the nurse resident's clinical exposure. This novel program provides necessary oversight, personalization and standardization to orientation and ongoing skill acquisition for newly licensed nurses, students, and assistive personnel. The position provides in-services and at the elbow support to staff at all levels. It supports staff with competency attainment and professional development. The position supports the Clinical Educators, Preceptors and Unit Leadership and is an evidence based best practice that many organizations nationally have adopted. The position adds value through the assessment of professional practice, Baptist values, and successful integration into the workforce


