This has been a year like no other. The COVID-19 pandemic profoundly impacted every aspect of our personal and professional lives. As a provider for orthopedic surgery and the treatment of musculoskeletal

diseases, we accepted many daunting challenges well outside of our customary sphere. We did so to support patients and colleagues across our system and at a time when little was known about the virus or how to stop it. This presented a demanding call to service, particularly for our nurses, answered with expert critical thinking and deep compassion. Their contributions were monumental by any measure.

The DAISY Awards were founded by the Barnes family in 1999 to remember their son Patrick, who died at age 33 from complications of the autoimmune disease idiopathic thrombocytopenia. The family wanted to create a way to honor the strong relationship their son had with his nurses. The Barnes family developed the DAISY program to say "thank you" to nursing staff for the exceptional care they provide. Today, the DAISY award program is in over 4,650 healthcare facilities and schools of nursing in all 50 states and in 28 countries committed to honoring nurses.

To date, NEBH has selected three extraordinary nurses from nearly 50 nominations submitted by colleagues, patients and families to receive the DAISY award. The awardees and all nominees receive a DAISY honoree pin for their ID badges. The awardees also receive "A Healer's Touch" sculpture representing the bond between a patient and caregiver, and a banner to display on the unit in appreciation of their compassionate care.

Congratulations to the NEBH DAISY Award winners to date. This has been a new initiative in 2020 and we are delighted to highlight these nurses in our annual report.

NEBH is building a culture of lifelong learning and professional collaboration to encourage nurse development, academic achievement and professional growth. Guidance from our Clinical Education and Professional Development Department supports nurses as valuable active partners who disseminate their expertise to provide outstanding patient care and elevate the professional practice of nursing.

In 2020, NEBH began its journey to establish and become accredited with a transition to practice program for new graduates. This is a 10-month transition program for new nurses into a clinical environment. The nurse residency program, and ultimately the accreditation, is with the American Nurses Credentialing Center (ANCC). Upon completion and submission of a written document that demonstrates compliance with required program criteria and outcomes, a formal review by PTAP appraisers from the ANCC will determine our program status.

The 2010 Institute of Medicine's (IOM) Future of Nursing Report called for 80% of RNs to hold bachelor's degrees by 2020, noting the need for higher education in nurses to care for a higher complexity patient. NEBH has surpassed the national goal of nursing staff having a BSN, MSN or Doctorate level degree in nursing.
