



Professional or Shared Governance is a model of planning and decisionmaking based on the principles of partnership, equity, accountability, and ownership. Expert Caring

The DAISY Award® for Extraordinary Nurses

In 1999, Bonnie and Mark Barnes envisioned a way to honor their son's early death due to complications of ITP (Idiopathic Thrombocytopenia Purpura). As the Barnes family discussed what to do in their son's memory, they knew that first and foremost, they needed to show appreciation for the gifts that nurses give their patients and families every day, just as they had experienced. The goal is to ensure that nurses know how deserving they are of society's profound respect for the education, training, and skill they put into their work, and especially for the compassion with which they deliver their care. The DAISY Award® is an international award, which recognizes extraordinary clinical nurses who care for patients by providing exceptional care every day.

NEBH proudly recognizes the nurses who have demonstrated outstanding care through recognition of this award. The 2023 DAISY Award® recipients are Ciara Lordan, BSN, RN, Clinical Nurse, PACU and Paulette Greene-Wallace, BSN, RN, Clinical Nurse, ICU.

May 2023 DAISY Recipient

Ciara Lordan, BSN, RN, Clinical Nurse, PACU

"Ciara was working in the Recovery Room (PACU) when we had gotten word that the OR team lost neuro monitoring signals and the patient was possibly suffering from a stroke. The OR was going to stabilize the neck, close the incision and the patient was going to be transferred to the PACU. Ciara was the nurse that would be taking care of the patient. From the moment the patient rolled into the PACU Ciara was assessing & managing the patient. She advocated for a transfer to the closest stroke center. The transfer out was seamless, with only one hiccup. The ambulance that arrived was BLS. The patient had multiple IVs and an A-line that would have to be removed before the patient was transferred unless a doctor or

nurse went with the patient. Ciara did not hesitate. She volunteered to go to the stroke center with the patient in the ambulance so there was no delay in having to call a new ambulance. During the whole event Ciara was assessing and reassessing the patient, talking with multiple team members from the ortho team to the hospitalist to anesthesia and continued to communicate to the stroke units care team members, and all while assuring the patient that he was going to be ok and they were going to get him to the stroke unit. I thought the transfer was done exceptionally well and the patient was exceptionally cared for and it was amazing to watch as a fellow nurse. I was very proud of the whole team, but Ciara went above and beyond and deserves to be recognized."



The Quality and Patient Safety Council assists in coordinating the hospital's patient safety program, conducts ongoing analysis and application of evidence-based patient safety practices to reduce the probability of adverse events, and analyzes any near misses and adverse events that occur. Each month, members discuss medication safety, infection control and patient falls as standing agenda items in addition to topics such as regulatory readiness and Joint Commission certification programs on spine surgery and total joint replacement surgery for hips/knees and shoulders. These certification programs demonstrate continuous compliance with performance standards in each of the disease specific areas, and they are a testament to the team's commitment to patient safety and high-quality care. NEBH's successful triennial Joint Commission Accreditation Survey was completed in January 2023 with low number of citations and only three clinical findings.

CI Roadmap: Total Joint Same Day Discharges

10/24/2023 Owner: 4 West UBC

AIM

1. Background

Due to a younger and healthier patient population, surgical advances, and changes in insurance authorizations for those undergoing total joint arthroplasty, NEBH has seen a decrease in patient length of stay (LOS), many discharging on the same day as their surgery. As a result, 4 West discharges an average of 7 TH/TK surgical patients home same day each month. Transitioning from traditional inpatient discharge processes and workflows to an outpaitnet care model remains a work in progress.

2. Current State

- Pre-implementation data collection from March 2023 – May 2023 revealed:
- 22 total TH/TK patients discharged from 4 West on the same day as their surgery from 9 different attending surgeons
 - Majority of the patients had THA (68%)
 - 23% of patients were unanticipated same day total joint discharges
- On average, patients were discharged within 3 hours and 6 minutes of admission to 4 West
 - The shortest time to discharge was 2 hours and 35 minutes
 - The longest LOS was 7 hours and 45 minutes

3. SMART Goal

Decrease the average length of stay for 4 West total joint same day discharge from 3 hours and 6 minutes to less than 3 hours by December 1, 2023.

MEASURE

4. Analysis

Root causes of extended LOS (5–7+ hours) as identified by 4 West nursing staff through data collection include:

- 1. Difficulty contacting ortho for DC paperwork
- 2. Unknown causes
- Errors on completed DC paperwork resulting in the need to contact ortho and then wait for corrections (mostly on Page 1s)
- 4. RN unsure which medications were pre-prescribed based off the DC med list
- 5. Issues with post-op orders (IP vs. DC per ambulatory care)
- 6. Spinal anesthetic slow to resolve

CHANGE

5. Proposed Countermeasures

The highest priority countermeasures include identifying specific barriers to expediting same day discharges, while improving the workflow and identifying roles and responsibilities. An interdisciplinary team was developed to create a process map of current workflow and countermeasures/proposed workflow. The team consists of nursing, rehab, physician's assistants, surgeons, case management and hospital leadership. Monthly meetings continue to finalize workflow and processes. Small tests of change have occurred throughout 2023, with the finalized go-live of the entirely improved same day program to be rolled out in October 2023.

6. Plan

- Re-initiate same day interdisciplinary work group and begin meeting monthly developed in 2020 and re-initiated in 5/2022
- Create process map of current workflow completed 8/2022
- Collect pre-data to determine root causes/ barriers — completed from 3/2023 – 5/2023
- Update of outpatient order set completed 8/2023, go-live 9/26/2023
- Meet with PA team to discuss roles and responsibilities — completed 6/27/2023
- 4 West nursing to collaborate with PA team to develop communication tree for which disciplines to call for assistance throughout different times in the day — completed 7/12/2023

- Determine medication and pre-prescribing workflow — completed 8/29/2023 determined that prescriptions will be completed in real time for better communication to RNs and ensuring that they are prescribed prior to patient's DC
- Finalize status types agreed upon by interdisciplinary team on 3/8/2023 — details finalized and to be communicated to surgeon practises at November's Surgical Scheduler meeting
- GO-live of program in its entirety December 1, 2023

SUSTAIN

7. Follow-Up

After all the elements of the improved same day program are implemented, data will be collected to ensure that the target of a discharge time of 3 hours or less is being sustained. The data collection periods will occur for 2 weeks at a time every three months throughout

the first year of implementation. If length of stay times begin to increase, the interdisciplinary group will be resurrected to assess for potential barriers and to ensure that the program elements are being sustained, making changes as necessary.

CI Roadmap: Spine Same Day Ambulation (SDA) in Post-Operative Spine Patients



AIM

1. Background

Currently, there is a high percentage of post-operative spine patients (pts) who are not ambulating on the day of surgery (DOS) or ambulation is not being documented in the medical record. Our goal is to ambulate spine surgery pts on DOS who are medically appropriate, 80% of the time, starting on 5 West.

2. Current State



3. SMART Goal

To improve SDA in post-operative spine patients at an average of 80% (monthly) on Jenks 5 West by December 2023. If a patient does not participate in SDA, there will be supporting documentation in the pts electronic medical record.

MEASURE

4. Analysis

There is a fair percentage of patients who decline out of bed (OOB) on the DOS due to the lack of pre-operative education and staff

reinforcement. Follow up documentation on why patients are not OOB DOS will assist in determining why a pt does not

ambulate — whether they refuse or there is a medical or pain issue limiting them from doing so.

CHANGE

5. Proposed Countermeasures

- Spine patients not OOB on DOS
 - Pt issue
 - Staffissue
- Preparing the pt focus on goal oriented care — OOB as soon as able/appropriate DOS
- Preparing the staff educate pt on importance of SDA and documentation for every spine pt for reasons why, if unable to ambulate DOS

6. Plan

- · Patient education:
 - Changes to MD office documents pts receive pre-op — complete
 - Add posters around 5 West units/PASU for pt visualization — complete
 - Changes made to pre-operative spine class slides for use in class by 9/8/22 — complete
 - Meet with Clinical Affiliation and Quality Performance Manager to review changes in Ubicare education and implement Ubicare — complete

- · Staff education:
 - Emails to educate importance of SDA to 5 West staff and use of audit tool created by Jess, documenting why pt not ambulating DOS by 8/10/22 — complete
 - Implement SDA audits which will address pt issues, staff discomfort to RN staff by 8/15/22 — complete
 - Meeting with RN Clinical Educators to discuss staff in-services to better educate regarding SDA by 8/17/22 — complete
 - Clinical update on documenting ambulation on day of surgery — 09/30/22 — complete
 - Rehab complete in-services on 5W (include poster) to increase staff confidence in getting patients OOB on day of surgery — complete

SUSTAIN

7. Follow-Up

- SDA Data will continue to be tracked throughout the remainder of 2023 and going forward
- Project rolled out on 5W, 5E and 4E still not meeting goal of 80% monthly average will re-group to plan other options and implement another PSDA cycle
- ICU patient appropriateness is parking lot item and will be further discussed with medical staff and team

In 2023 NEBH launched the Nurse Scientist role. The inaugural role is held by Christine Bell, PhD, RN, CAPA, WCC. Chris is a change agent and a leader responsible for implementing an infrastructure that provides nurses support to shape the work environment by assuring their practice is evidence-based and nursing knowledge is generated through research. The Nurse Scientist promotes a culture of inquiry to bridge the gap between research and practice by engaging nurses in research and EBP with a focus on guiding the development of an infrastructure of resources including mentors and coaches.

The Nurse Scientist's work is integrally involved and aligned with the goals of maintaining NEBH's Magnet® designation as well as the organization's and nursing's strategic plans.

Wellbeing Program

- Mindfulness activities are an evidence-based approach, well studied among healthcare professionals to aid in well becoming.

- In 2023, we offered 3 educational offerings supported by our Nurse Wellbeing consultant.
- Of those who participated:
 - 100% intend to incorporate a mindful practice into work life
 - 100% are able to are able to identify proactive responses to stressful situations
 - 100% are able to discuss healthcare provider burnout
 - 100% are able to discuss stress management principles and burnout prevention
- Participants said that as a result of this program:
 - "It is very beneficial to reflect on nursing practice and how we need to care for ourselves in order to better care for others."
 - "Anticipate it will enhance my personal life by being able to better manage my professional stress."
 - "More balance throughout the day — trying to go for mini walks, unplugging for lunch, etc."
 - "Implement these into my practice & encourage others to do the same."



Longevity of Nurses at NEBH (years)




